




### Researchers, students and faculty respondents who use primary sources by region




### Do teachers include primary sources in a course's learning objective?



### Top 10 ways primary sources are found




### If digital primary sources are unavailable at an institution, the top 2 ways that researchers, students and faculty across career stages gain access:

## Librarian respondents who have purchased primary sources by region




## Last purchased primary sources

## Involved in decision making about purchases




## What are librarians doing to alert their patrons of new collections?

## Budget priorities

**71%** of librarians said that faculty members make recommendations about content to purchase. Demand from users and faculty was reported as the top factor that would encourage institutes to purchase.

## Satisfied with usage

**52%** of librarians report being somewhat satisfied with the use of primary sources in their libraries.
